Christ and the Christmas Miracle

PROBABLY, never before in the world's history has there been a time when there was such an imperative necessity for enlightenment in relation to the origin and destiny of man, the earth on which he functions, and the Creator of all things which exist in our solar system. History records perilous times in the past that have lead to the downfall of nations and the principal causes which have resulted in such appalling disasters; but previously these calamities have been partially, if not wholly, localized. Many nations have grown into world prominence, flourished, expanded, and then fallen into decadence, and in time the very existnce of many of them has even been forgotten. Serious disasters, yes; all of which could have been avoided; but they were not *world* disasters, such as humanity is facing today.

ND IT came to pass in those days, that there went out a decree from Caesar Augustus, that all the world should be taxed.

(And this taxing was first made when Cyrenius was governor of Syria.)

And all went to be taxed, every one into his own city.

And Joseph also went up from Galilee, cut of the city of Nazareth, into Judea, unto the city of David, which is called Bethlehem: (because he was of the house and lineage of David:)

To be taxed with Mary his espoused wife, being great with child.

And so it was, that, while they were there, the days were accomplished that she should be delivered.

And she brought forth her firstborn son, and wrapped him in swaddling clothes, and laid him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn. St. Luke 2: 1-7.

What an arresting contrast, what a study in power, is presented in the above passage from St. Luke's gospel, describing the birth of Jesus the Christ! On the one hand is the oppressive might of the Roman Emperor, able to tax "all the world" by decree and to move whole populations around at will. On the other hand, almost unnoticed, and denied houseroom, is the spiritual power—a tiny baby thing in its beginnings, but destined to grow and spread and eventually to free all men from tyranny and oppression.

The first half of this story is familiar to us all in these days. We know much of dictators, the high cost of government, and the resultant heavy taxes; displaced persons abound, and whole segments of the population have been forced to move at the whim of one man. The world still has its Caesars and government by decree. The other form of power, the spiritual, is still all too little known or understood, even in the twentieth century.

Down through the centuries, since St. Luke wrote his gospel, there has been a constant struggle for freedom, and history records the achievements of the human race in its agelong fight to cast off the heavy yoke that the Caesars of the world would fasten around its neck. Much, very much has been accomplished to enable the humble, average man to enjoy a certain amount of liberty. to live his own life, and to express the dignity of his being in the daily living. The eighteenth and nineteenth centuries. in particular, saw great strides taken in this direction. In many lands men achieved the right to live without the fear of the decrees of one man and in comparative safety of person and possessions. In less favored countries the ferment was stirring, and the downtrodden everywhere lifted their heads in hope. Then in recent years a new breed of Caesars arose (we call them dictators), who sought absolute power and threatened to plunge the globe into another reign of terror. It seems the fight is not yet won.

Perhaps never before has the subject of government occupied men's minds as it does today. People weigh theory against theory, ideology against ideology, as though in some "ism" lies the answer to the present dilemma. It often seems that the heart of the whole matter escapes their attention as they argue.

The fact is that any government that rules from without, even a democratic regime, tends to become oppressive in time, unless the consciousness of the people expands and grows so that more and more the laws are written in their hearts, instead of being piled up on the statute books. Man has fought hard to bring order out of chaos, freedom out of slavery, and dignity out of serfdom, and is still fighting. He cannot rest upon past performance, but must follow the way onward and upward. The tendency of government to become "big," and to exercise more and more power over the individual, must be held in check by increasing understanding and individual self-control. As a new age draws near the old ways are being scrutinized and tested, and this is good. However, it is important to remember that what is needed is more self-government, not less. In a sense all outward authorities are but caretaker governments. They hold office until the time when love—which works from within shall rule, instead of law applied from When that time comes the without. Kingdom of Christ will be established.

The path of evolution is a spiral. It does not go straight upward leaving behind once and for all the old conditions, but turns in slowly ascending circle. Old problems crop up to be dealt with anew on a different level under slightly improved conditions, until the lesson is firmly established in the consciousness of the race. Seeming recessions are opportunities to appraise methods and values and to gather strength for the next forward move, using past experiences to achieve a higher level than before. This is the slow and sure way of human evolution. The setbacks of the present time act as a goad to prod humanity into seeking and finding the true freedom, which cannot be conferred from without but comes only by growth from within. This is the liberty with which Christ makes one free, and His is the rule that shall even-



tually be established "for the government shall be upon His shoulder."

It is difficult, perhaps impossible, to convey spiritual truth in words. There is always the tendency to materialize it and make the interpretation in terms of our own understanding of the moment, whereas Truth is Eternal in the heavens and can be rightly understood only by means of the spiritual faculties within. Anna Kingsford, a nineteenth century mystic and occultist who wrote of the inner meaning of Christianity, said: "Truth itself is unutterable save from God to God." This means that only by the spiritual nature can spiritual matters be apprehended. Max Heindel voiced the same thought when he warned students of The Rosicrucian Cosmo-Con*ception* in regard to charts and dia-spirals and extracts from each the grams. "They must be spiritually conceived." These thoughts must be borne in mind as we approach the subject of the Kingdom of Christ. Those who attempt to fix the Kingdom in time or space do not begin to understand its nature or spiritual meaning. There are some who look forward to its establishment on earth very soon, but as one reads what they write one is tempted to think that they, too, "are looking for a king to slav their foes and lift them high," and that little more than the Jews of old do they understand the inwardness of the Christian message. There can be no Kingdom of Christ on earth except it first be established within the hearts of men, yet those who are ready may enter it now, for it is not an outer but an inner rule.

Poets come nearer to expressing truth in words than the rest of us, so let one of them speak for us now:

"For not in far off realms of space The spirit hath its throne: In every heart it findeth place And waiteth to be known.

Thought answereth alone to thought And soul with soul hath kin: The outward God he findeth not Who finds not God within.

But if the vision come to thee Revealed by inward sign. Earth shall be filled with majesty And with His glory shine."

In this light the Kingdom of Christ is in our midst, and the earnest seeker may find the way to enter now. For such there is an alternative to the slow spiral way of evolution. It is not spectacular, but hidden: not a way of self-glorification, but of humble compassion and service. It is not confused. contradictory, complex, as the spiral path tends to be. It is simple, straightforward, direct, but steep, for it cuts through the centers of the evolutionary essence of the experience in store for humanity. It is the inner way illustrated by the symbol of the caduceus. A man may enter it by passing into the mystery of the heart of his being, and by the light of the Christ love may follow it to the summit of attainment and the fulfillment of his destiny. It is indeed the way of liberation, for by following the law within one becomes freed from outer control. What kind of a law is that which a man cannot carry in his mind? Our secular laws fill volumes and more volumes are needed to explain the first, or perhaps further to confuse their meaning. The Christ Law of Love makes all this unnecessary, because as one loves, aspires, and lives in the light of its Wisdom, he becomes in himself that which he follows, and the light of the Spirit, at first dimly seen, becomes a flame that illumines the whole nature.

The student of the Mysteries, or one who is preparing himself in the hope that one day he may become a pupil of a Mystery School, and so find this inner path, fixes his eves on the goal Initiation, by which he may obtain formal admission into the school with certain privileges and powers. If he does not receive this, he may become discouraged and consider himself more or less of a failure. Without going too deeply into this subject of Initiation, let us remember just a few things:

The Guardians of the Mysteries are those who have fulfilled them in their own beings. They desire to help others toward the same accomplishment, and at all times reveal as much to individuals as their development demands, and to the masses whatever truth the times warrant and require. Mystery Schools, their methods and instruction, change with the onward course of evolution. What in one age is withheld, or revealed only to those specially prepared, in another time becomes available to all. There is actually no hard and fast line between the Mysteries and public knowledge, for it shifts with the growth of consciousness. When the general level of intelligence is low, advanced teaching must be given in secret and through the Schools, but when the general standard is higher a great deal can be given out openly. For instance, in the Western World in our own times much has been freely published which earlier could be given only under symbol or by secret teaching. The Western Wisdom Teachings speak in plain terms and point the seeker to a safe and sane method of attainment. With this knowledge available and in this Christian era which has opened the Way to all who have reached sufficient soul maturity, there are now no barriers other than



those which we erect. Even without any outward ceremony, the one who makes the law of Christ's Kingdom his law is truly taking the short cut. Without any sudden development of clairvoyance his perceptions are heightened, and he sees and knows what was before hidden. With every effort to govern himself he takes a step upward and loosens the ties that bind him to earth.

Before the Christ can reign, He must be born. Who can tell when the birth of the Christ Child takes place within an individual? It comes in the darkness and the quiet, almost unnoticed. In embryo it has always been there. It is the Life Spirit principle in man, kingly in its own right, because the World of Life Spirit *is* the Kingdom. It waits for that moment of soul maturity when the proud Intellect brings to the feet of the Christ all its matchless treasures, to be used thenceforth in the service of love.

The world today is desperately in need of this service. Nothing else will bring order into the confusion of ideas that is filling people with fear. Our feelings of insecurity, our nervous breakdowns, our "cold wars," "wars of ideas," and "wars of nerves," are the lot of a race that has not penetrated beyond the World of Thought and found the harmonizing power of the Universal Love. No decree of a dictator can establish this harmony, no act of parliament or congress can legislate it into being, but the one in whom the Christ is born finds in each day that dawns many opportunities to help his fellows establish it within. He learns to speak the universal language, to meet people on their own ground, and awaken \mathbf{or} strengthen their faith. Often no preaching is necessary, for if the chord of Love is strong and vibrant it has power to awaken a similar vibration in others.

At the winter solstice the Christian world, yes, and parts of the world not formally Christian, give attention and thought to the gospel story of the Birth in the Manger. Momentarily the confusion and strife are forgotten as the Love vibration envelopes the earth and its aura in a great spiritual flood and men catch a fleeting vision of the better way of life. Christmas time is the symbol of all those things for which the heart of humanity longs todayunderstanding. goodwill, and peace, love. To those who will have it so, this symbol can be translated into permanent reality.

Our Eternal Value

HE agnostic materialists' concept of man is that he is a biological entity; a soulless automaton, coming from nowhere and going nowhere after physical death. To them, death is extinction; there is nothing beyond the grave. As a result of this conviction they interpret moral life in terms of physical existence only, ignoring its spiritual aspect. Not believing in the continuity of life, they acquire no eternal values while on the earth plane.

Many good men living hold this concept in the face of the continuity of life as evidenced in nature and Christ's Resurrection. The shattering disillusionment of World War II at the height of Christian civilization has crystallized their belief. Physical death is an unalterable fact of mortal life, but unless the continuity of life be a conviction with us, all earthly right endeavor is futile. Conceding this point it is rational judgment to make provision while here, for our entry on the next life plane, so that we will not arrive there status quo, spiritually.

Many human lives are abruptly terminated by accident, disease, or selfdestruction. If through ignorance or

wilful neglect Egos have acquired no eternal values while here, they arrive on the other side spiritually bankrupt. However, if they believed in the continuity of life and prepared for it, they would have some spiritual capital with which to begin the new adventure of living in the land of the Spirit.

There are two kinds of security tangible and intangible. The former consists of material possessions that insure economic protection. It is of temporary value on the earth plane only and has no validity on other life planes. We cannot take it with us when we leave here. All are familiar with the insecurity of mortal values. Intangible security consists of assets of mind, character, and Spirit, which are imperishable. It is a cosmic medium of exchange. As it is necessary to build economic security for survival on the earth plane, it is equally necessary to acquire spiritual security for the future of the Ego. The more of this we build here the more secure we are after transition. Many scriptural texts admonish us to do this.

A concrete example of one who obeys these injunctions is John D. Rockefeller Jr. He was in the news limelight

in December, 1946 for an outright gift of \$8,500,000 to the United Nations to purchase a tract of land in midtown Manhattan for their permanent home. He regards his vast material earth wealth as a trust of which he is the present custodian. He lives a Christian life to the best of his enlightment; tithes his income; gives time and effort to race service; contributes large sums of money to philanthropic and cultural causes for human betterment and gives a good account of his earthly stewardship. However, we know that it is the attitude that counts-not the amount of material means used philanthropically. The widow's mite may be a much larger deposit in the cosmic bank of the Spirit than millions of dollars given without the desire to share and serve.

Many people regard physical death as a passport to heaven irrespective of their spiritual status on earth prior to their passing. This is a childish delusion. ignoring the cosmic Law of Consequence. Transition is not regeneration. We enter the next life plane in the same spiritual status that we leave mortal life. Those who are spiritually impoverished here confront much purging on the other side. Our mortal value is easily appraised in terms of physical, personal, social, cultural, professional, and financial assets. But what about our immortal value? What have we accomplished through living the earth years that is of worth-of use to us in our next life experience? Life in the present is but an interlude between the eternity of the past and the eternity of the future. At longest, even if lived to the normal span of years, it is very brief. When the light of mortal life is extinguished the Ego disinhabits its robe of senseless clay and goes forth to meet the challenge of the great unknown. Our eternal value can never be fully reckoned until after the great transition. The grave is the only true test of one's immortality-of what values survive the physical years. This is verified in the lives of the saints.

martyrs, mystics, and others who have left living monuments that defy the corrosion of centuries.

In the present atomic era, physical survival is the big problem. The business of living has become so complex that values which transcend the material are obscured. Realizing how transitory earth life is, we should give serious thought now to foreplanning our spiritual status for the land of the Spirit. In so doing we will be able to omit the elementary preparation there. How can we ascertain our present eternal value? By putting the searchlight of truth upon ourselves in honest self-analysis. We should ask ourselves:

If transition should suddenly come would it find me spiritually prepared?

What assets of mind and Spirit have I acquired?

What Christian virtues of love, kindness, mercy, compassion, tolerance, pa-



tience, courage, fortitude, generosity, and unselfishness do I possess and apply?

What effective good have I accomplished?

What have I shared with the unfortunate?

What unselfish service have I rendered without thought of self-reward?

What account can I give of my earthly stewardship?

These and other self-revealing questions, if honestly answered, will enlighten us as to our spiritual status. Let us ascend from life on the sense plane to a higher consciousness that upholds imperishable values and builds soul security.

Gleanings of a Mystic

(FIRST INSTALLMENT)

Initiation - What It Is and Is Not

Part I

T IS NO rare occurrence to receive questions relating to initiation, and we are also frequently asked to state whether this order or that society is genuine, and whether the initiations they offer to all comers who have the price are *bona fide*. For that reason it seems necessary to write a treatise on the subject so that students of The Rosicrucian Fellowship may have an official statement for reference and guidance in the future.

In the first place let it be clearly understood that we consider it reprehensible to express condemnation of any society or order, no matter what its practices. It may be perfectly sincere and honest according to its light. We do not believe that we rise in the opinion of discriminating men and women by speaking in disparaging terms of others; neither are we laboring under the delusion that we have all the truth and other societies are plunged in Egyptian darkness. We reiterate what we have often said before, that all religions have been given to mankind by the Recording Angels, who know the spiritual requirements of each class, nation, and race, and have the intelligence to give to each a form of worship perfectly



suited to its particular need; and thus Hinduism is suited to the Hindu, Mohammedanism to the Arab, and the Christian religion to those born in the Western Hemisphere.

The Mystery Schools of each religion furnish to the more advanced members of the race or nation embracing it a higher teaching, which, if lived, advances them into a higher sphere of spirituality than their brethren. But as the religion of the backward races is of a lower order than the religion of the pioneers, the Christian nations, so also the Mystery Teaching of the East is more elementary than that of the West, and the Hindu or Chinese Initiate is on a corresponding lower rung of the ladder of attainment than the Western Mystic. Please ponder this well so that you may not fall a victim to misguided people who try to persuade others that the Christian religion is crude compared with oriental cults. Ever westward in the wake of the shining sun, the light of the world, has gone the star of empire, and is it not reasonable to suppose that the spiritual light has kept pace with civilization, or even preceded it as thought precedes action? We hold that such is the case, that the Christian religion is the loftiest yet given to man, and that to repudiate the Christian religion, esoteric or exoteric, for any of the older systems is analogous to preferring the older textbooks of science to the newer ones which embrace discoveries to date.

Neither are the practices of Eastern aspirants to the higher life to be imitated by Westerners; we refer particularly to the breathing exercises. They are both beneficial and necessary to the unfoldment of the Hindu, but it is otherwise with the Western aspirant. To him it is dangerous to practice breathing exercises for soul unfoldment; they will even prove subversive of soul growth, and they are, moreover, absolutely unnecessary. The reason is this:

involution During the threefold Spirit has become gradually encrusted in a threefold body. In the Atlantean Epoch man was at the nadir of materiality. We are just now rounding the lowest point on the arc of involution and starting upward on the arc of evolution. At this point, then, all mankind is immured in this earthly prison house to such a degree that spiritual vibrations are almost killed. This is, of course, particularly true of the backward races and the lower classes in the Western world. The atoms in such backward race bodies are vibrating at an exceedingly low rate, and when in the course of time one of these people develops to a point where it is possible to further him upon the path of attainment, it is necessary to raise this vibratory pitch of the atom so that the vital body, which is the medium of occult growth, may to a certain extent be liberated from the deadening force of the physical atom. This result is attained by means of breathing exercises, which in time accelerate the vibration of the atom, and allow the spiritual growth necessary to the individual to take place.

These exercises may also be used by a great number of people in the Western world, particularly those who are not at all concerned about their spiritual advancement. But even among those who desire soul growth there are many who are not yet at the point where the atoms of their bodies have evolved to such a pitch of vibration that accelera-

tion beyond the usual measure would injure them. Here the breathing exercises would do no harm; but if given to a person who is really at the point where he can enter the path of advancement ordinarily mapped out for the Hindu's precocious brothers and sisters in the West, in other words, when he is nearly ready for initiation and when he would be benefited by spiritual exercises, then the case is far otherwise.

During the eons which we have spent in evolution since the time when we were in Hindu bodies. our atoms have accelerated their vibratory pitch enormously, and as said in the case of one who is really nearly ready for initiation. the pitch of vibration is higher than that of the average man or woman. Therefore, he does not need breathing exercises to accelerate this pitch, but certain spiritual exercises suited to him individually which will advance him on the proper path. If such a person at this critical period meets some one who ignorantly or unscrupulously gives him breathing exercises, and if he follows the instructions accurately in the hope of getting quick results, he will get them quickly but in a manner he has not looked for, since the vibratory rate of the atoms in his body will in a very short time become accelerated to such a pitch that it will seem to him as if he were walking on air; then also an improper cleavage of the vital body may take place, and either consumption or insanity follows. Now please put this down where it will burn itself into your consciousness in letters of fire: Initiation is a spiritual process, and spiritual progress cannot be accomplished by physical means, but only by spiritual exercises.

There are many orders in the West which profess to *initiate anyone who has* the price. Some of these orders have names closely resembling our own, and we are constantly asked by students whether they are affiliated with us. In order to settle this once and for all, (Continued on page 575)

Studies in the Cosmo-Conception

This department is devoted to a study of the Rosicrucian Philosophy by the Socratic Method, the material being taken from The Rosicrucian Cosmo-Conception.

The Worlds

Q. What are the invisible worlds called? A. In the Rosicrucian teaching the universe is divided into seven different worlds, or states of matter, as follows:

1. World of God.

2. World of Virgin Spirits.

3. World of Divine Spirit.

4. World of Life Spirit.

5. World of Thought.

6. Desire World.

7. Physical World.

Q. Why are they so divided?

A. This division is not arbitrary but necessary, because the substance of each of these worlds is amenable to laws which are practically inoperative in the others.

Q. What are some of these differences? A. For instance, in the Physical World matter is subject to gravity, contraction and expansion. In the Desire World there is neither heat nor cold, and forms levitate as easily as they gravitate.

Q. Are time and distance important in the Desire World?

A. Time and distance are governing factors of existence in the Physical World but are almost non-existent in the Desire World.

Q. How do these two worlds compare in density?

A. The matter of these worlds also varies in density, the Physical World being the densest of the seven.

Q. Is the matter of any one world uniform?

A. No, each world is subdivided into seven regions or sub-divisions of matter.

Q. How does this appear in the Physical World?

A. In the Physical World the solids, liquids, and gases form the three denser subdivisions, the remaining four being ethers of varying densities. In the other worlds similar subdivisions are necessary because the matter of which they are composed is not of uniform density.

Q. What further divisions should be considered?

A. There are two further distinctions to be made. The three dense subdivisions of the Physical World—the solids, liquids, and gases—constitute what is termed the Chemical Region. The four finer or etheric subdivisions of the Physical World constitute what is known as the Etheric Region.

Q. Of what is the Chemical Region the basis?

A. The substance of this Region is the basis of all dense form. From this chemical matter all the *forms* of mineral, plant, animal, and man have been built, hence they are as truly chemical as the substances which are commonly so termed.

Q. Does this apply to every objective thing?

A. Whether we consider the mountain or the cloud that envelops its top, the juice of the plant or the blood of the animal, the spider's thread, the wing of the butterfly, or the bones of the elephant, the air we breathe or the water we drink—all are composed of the same chemical substance.

Q. Is not the ether also physical matter? A. The ether is also physical matter. It is not homogeneous, as science alleges, but exists in four different states.

Q. What is its main use?

A. The ether is the medium of ingress for the quickening spirit which imparts *vitality* to the forms in the Chemical Region.

Radiation

Astrology Department Neptune--Aspects and Positions

Part 1

T IS INTERESTING to note the correlation of Neptune, ruler of Pisces, with the other two signs of the water triplicity. Cancer, cardinal and ruled by the Moon, is water as a generator of power—rivers, streams, waterfalls, and rain; Scorpio, fixed, is ice—compressed and static—symbolizing resource of power; Pisces, mutable, is water as an enveloping agency—fog, mists, miasmas, and above all the mighty ocean which encircles all bodies of land.

Cancer is the maternal body which generates sustenance for the new incarnation. Scorpio, ruled by Pluto, is the "collective unconscious"-the vast ocean of astral forces which surrounds the body of humanity. Pisces is the "Great which we move and have our being. Neptune represents our capacity to "open up" or to "tune in" to the recognition of the Higher Agencies and to unfold our awareness of the divinity of Life. Through the "instrumentation faculty" of Neptune we can, depending on our states of consciousness, contact the sources of exalted inspiration or we can open the door to Pluto's realm and walk in the caverns of our unregenerate states.

This "overshadowing" of Neptune has been treated in a previous article by interpretation of the patterns involving the twelfth house—the overshadowing of our own past incarnation which must be redeemed, to a degree, in the present one. However, your own personal variation of Neptune's direct influence is shown by the house of your chart that has Pisces on the cusp or Pisces intercepted—and the house which Neptune itself occupies.

The former shows where illusion and disillusionment are concentrated; the channel of experience that indicates your need for developing Faith; if Neptune is afflicted, the Pisces house indicates where and how, in the past, you betraved Faith and now need realignment with Principle. The Pisces house can indicate a relationship-pattern of deep spiritual value or one that is masked and veiled--its inner reality is not outwardly recognized by others. It is well to realize that the Pisces house of your chart is the one which you, yourself, may understand the least clearly—its realities are more "occult" than objective in quality and significance. It is where you can mislead yourself because it shows how, in the past, you may have misled others. In the extremities of your difficulties the Pisces house will show what, most likely, will impel you to seek Divine Assistance; seeing that chapter of your life through dark glasses you are moved to ask for guidance from Him who sees clearly.

The house containing your Neptune is your direct expression of spiritual consciousness, the department of life in which you can be qualified to lead others to establish Faith, the focal point of your idealism, your capacity for establishing Heaven-on-Earth. Through your Neptune house the Divine says: "Be ye the voice for my words and the hands for my work." It is where and how you express your understanding of "Thy will be done, in earth, as it is in heaven."

Because of Neptune's affinity with the element of water, the fourth, eighth, and twelfth houses may be understood to be the most "congenial" for its placement. They represent the emotional and astral levels of consciousness and, placed therein, Neptune's sensitivity is more

definitely emphasized. State of the signs Pisces and Cancer are considered Neptune's two "best signs" because of their fluidic, emotional quality. Furthermore, since the Moon and Neptune are "personal mother" and "universal mother," respectively. the Moon's sign corresponds to the quality Neptune more than does any other, except Pisces. Therefore Cancer is considered the

"exaltation sign" of Neptune—the dynamic, cardinal quality of the sign amplifies the sensitive mutability of Pisces. Neptune in this sign expresses with more "force" than it does in its dignity.

Neptune's slow travel—transiting each sign in almost the span of a generation—indicates it to be of great value from the standpoint of cyclic research. Millions of incarnations are made during Neptune's position in any sign; each group is like a miniature "life-wave" attuned to certain expressions of cosmic consciousness. The correlation of Uranus with Neptune in this respect is of particular value. Consider:

During the later years of the eigh-

teenth century occurred a stellar event of primary magnitude—the conjunction of Uranus with Neptune in the sign Sagittarius. New concepts were born, new ideals, new visions, and new prophecies of a liberated mankind were projected into the human scheme of things. Revolutions occurred, the old was shattered by blows of disintegrative effect. This conjunction carried over into Capricorn in the early eighteen hundreds. Metaphysical teachings were released, new concepts of art and morality were promulgated.

This activation by Uranus and Neptune was in the nature of a "cosmic lunation"—the dynamic Uranus and

> provided a "new birth" for $_{\mathrm{the}}$ entire human race. The "full moon" of this ''lunation'' was the opposition of Uranus in Sagittarius-Capricorn to Neptune in Gemini-Cancer during the early years of the twentieth century. A world war of devastating significance brought out into the open the levels of unrest and change which had been "gestating" all during

the last century. In other words, Uranus had returned to the "lunation point" and Neptune, like the full moon after a Sun-Moon lunation, had reached its halfway point. Persons who incarnate during a major planetary opposition do so for greater *awareness* of certain soul principles; Uranus-opposition-Neptune is *awareness* for the entire human family—a critical point in our evolution.

Those persons who incarnated while Neptune was in Aries were of the generation of visionary pioneers, particularly those who had Neptune in Aries and Uranus in Cancer—tumultuous souls who busied themselves in establishing the "new look" in human affairs: metaphysical teachings, woman's suf-

Each planet of our solar system is the body of a great spiritual Intelligence, reflecting divine Light and Life upon its sister planets and their inhabitants, thus encouraging $_{\rm the}$ growth of consciousness and moral de-velopment. The impulse sent out by each planet partakes of the nature of the beings with which it has been in contact, and we therefore live in the vari-colored light of all the Planetary Spirits and the beings upon all the

planets.

frage, birth control and all the other agencies of freeing humanity from outworn and crystallized concepts. We who incarnated during the opposition of the two planetary giants came into a world full of unrest and disturbance. We, by inner development and understanding. can take our rightful place in the scheme of things and make our contribution to the New Age, or, by inner undevelopment we can live-or try to live- by approaches that pertain to a bygone age and so find ourselves "out of line" with the changing aspect of things. Study Neptune incharts to determine how the persons concerned can be considered of this age, not just in it. Study the twelfth house conditions, the Saturn conditions and the afflictions to Neptune or to Neptune-Uranus, and get some sort of picture of how-or how not-the person is cyclicly "at home with this age."

Neptune by position in the fourth, eighth, and twelfth houses conveys a certain natural sensitivity even if it is unaspected—this pattern holds promise that sometime during the incarnation occult experiences are to be met and dealt with. It naturally follows that afflicted aspects to Neptune when in these houses are particularly acute.

Neptune unaspected, like any other unaspected planet, is, on a given cycle, a "traveler starting out on a journey." If a traveler is not properly guided or instructed he easily risks taking the wrong roads, thus making many detours and delays before he arrives at his destination. Since Neptune is the transcendent expression of the "mental triad"-(Moon, Mercury, and Neptune being the "triad of transmission")-the start of its new journey must be prepared for by (1) discipline and transmutation of subconscious feelings and redirection of feminine reaction-patterns—symbolized by the Moon—and (2) knowledge by acquisition of facts pertaining to spiritual life—as an expression of the intellectual faculties, symbolized by Mercury. Neptune, misdirected, can result in perversion of understanding which can bring the person into contact with the forces of black magic; such experiences result in various forms of disintegration and loss of "inner plane awareness." This, in turn brings many difficult experiences—during later lives—by which realignment with Truth must be made. Study carefully the house position and house rulership of an unaspected Neptune to determine, as clearly as possible, what direction Neptune should take for its immediate unfoldment.

Since Neptune is a feminine, fluidic, and impressionable vibration give careful study to the planet which disposits it—(Venus for Taurus and Libra, Mercury for Gemini and Virgo, Moon for Cancer, and Sun for Leo)—because the conditions of the dispositor will indicate the essence of "what comes through Neptune." For example, if Neptune is in Cancer—where it is particularly sensitive anyway—and the Moon carries an afflicted Mars vibration the indication is that the sex urge and the po-

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tential for destruction can be strongly stimulated by the activities of Neptune by lunations, progressed Moon, etc. If Neptune is in Taurus and Venus is unafflicted then the person can be a focal point for a very spiritual loveradiation, as well as an artistic agency. Synthesize the dispositor of Neptune very carefully and, in your assistance to another, plan your "road map" so that the person will know ahead of time when certain subconscious tendencies will be activated and he can prepare his inner defences. Help him to understand the subtlety of Neptune's expressions—people who appear on the scene when his Neptune is activated negatively simply objectify his own inner subconscious levels. They may "tempt" him, try to mislead him for their own selfish purposes, or give him false instruction. Therefore he must, for best results, "cleanse his thoughts and reactions and establish awareness of what he really is, why he is, and what he can become.

The Children of Sagittarius, 1948

AGITTARIUS is the third of the fiery triplicity, representing common fire, or adaptable spirituality, and its natives usually live in the shifting strata of life. They thrive best when traveling or making changes in their work and environment.

Jupiter, the planet of optimism and benevolence, rules Sagittarius, and those born when the Sun is in this ninth sign of the zodiac are usually "hail fellow well met" in their sphere of life. Generous and tolerant in their attitudes toward others, the Sagittarians carry an uplifting vibration of friendliness and joviality wherever they go.

We find two general classes of people born under this double bodied sign. One is appropriately symbolized by the animal part of the centaur (half man and half horse), and is composed of roving soldiers of fortune, habitues of the race tracks and gambling halls. This type is out chiefly for a "good time," with a constantly changing scene. The moral standards are apt to be low and the nature unstable. Lacking in respect for the law, these people are often drawn into the less violent type of crime.

The more developed Sagittarian, represented by the human part of the centaur, aiming the bow of aspiration at the stars, is of an entirely different nature. He is extremely idealistic, lawabiding, trustworthy, and likely to be respected and honored for his integrity and benevolence. Orthodoxy and regard for the conventions of society are strong in the natures of these natives, however, and this sometimes prevents their joining the ranks of the pioneers.

Usually endowed with a retentive memory and a quick and ready wit, the Sagittarians are admirable conversationalists and orators. As lawyers and ministers of the gospel, they stimulate and hold their audiences with a ready flow of facts and experiences.

Children born during the Sagittarian solar month this year will all come under the beneficent influence of Saturn trine Jupiter, and of Neptune sextile Pluto. These aspects are fortunate in both a practical and spiritual way, indicating strength of character, a philosophical mind, a benevolent disposition, and a strong sense of justice and fair play. There is also sound financial judgment, as well as spiritual insight.

Several other aspects usher in the solar month, most of them favorable. The Sun squares Saturn from November 22 to December 6, which indicates the need of being careful in health matters, as well as endeavoring to see the bright side of life at all times. This vibration results from selfishness and lack of consideration for others, in previous lives, and therefore brings opportunities to cultivate unselfishness and consideration.

Three aspects to Venus brighten the beginning of the solar month: the sextile to Mars and Jupiter, and the trine to Uranus, lasting until December 7, December 4, and November 30, respectively, and all serve to accentuate the love (personal) side of the nature. Children born during this time will be ambitious. aspiring, adventuresome, and demonstrative in the affections. They should be taught moderation in spending as well as in display of the emotions. There is apt to be a liking for music, art, and poetry, and friendships and marriage are favored. The accumulation of wealth is also favored. and these natives will be jovial, optimistic, and generous.

There is also a conjunction of Jupiter with Mars from November 22 to December 11, which strengthens the constitution and increases the vitality. The earning capacity is also favored, but the mentality has a tendency to be tricky and deceitful.

Another favorable Venusian vibration begins November 25 and lasts until December 6: the sextile to Saturn. This aspect indicates diplomacy, tact, thrift, and a sense of justice. The tastes are simple and the morality high. General success in life is strongly favored.

Saturn trines Mars from November 26 to December 13, a configuration which gives a capable, determined, and energetic nature. There is executive ability, along with the forcefulness and endurance necessary for accomplishment. The health is also favored.

Beginning November 28 and lasting until December 14, the Sun is sextile to Neptune. This vibration favors the possibility of developing the spiritual faculties, for it intensifies the spiritual vibrations in the aura. There is a love for the occult, and if other aspects favor, musical ability of an inspirational kind.

Another aspect to the Sun, the conjunction with Mercury, begins November 29 and lasts until December 21. This favors the memory and mentality, except when the orb is 3 degrees or less.

From November 29 until December 7, Mercury squares Saturn, a vibration which is apt to bring delays, slander, and secret enemies into the life, until the native has learned the lessons of uprightness, truthfulness, and friendliness. There is a liking for the occult, but an inclination to study it selfishly.

Two more fortunate aspects to Mercury begin December 5th and last until the 13th: the sextile to Neptune, and the trine to Pluto. Children with these vibratory patterns have a mind peculiarly adapted to the occult art, and sometimes develop a supernormal faculty. Magnetic healing is favored.

From December 12 to December 21, the Sun opposes Uranus, a configuration which makes a person high strung and apt to give way to the emotions on small provocation. Careful training in self-control and poise should be given these children, as well as in regard for the sanctity of marriage.

Uranus is also squared by Mercury from December 4 until the end of the solar month. This vibration tends toward an erratic, impulsive mentality, and accentuates the need for training in poise and self-control.

Two more favorable aspects to Mercury begin December 18 and last the rest of the solar month: the trine to Saturn and the conjunction with Jupiter. The trine to Saturn will greatly stabilize the mind, giving it depth and the power of concentration. There is good reasoning ability, and a patient persistence which permits no temporary failure to bar ultimate success. The conjunction with Jupiter gives a cheerful, optimistic, and versatile side to the mentality. Law and literature, as well as health, are strongly favored.

This child's basic nature is definitely that of fixed earth, since he has the Sun and four planets in Taurus, one other planet (Pluto) in a fixed (Leo) sign, another (Neptune) in an earthy (Virgo) sign, and a fixed sign (Aquarius) on the Ascendant. However, although Taurus is a fixed, earthy sign, we find that its earthiness is mitigated in this case by the trine of the Sun, Uranus, and Mercury to Neptune in Virgo. This indicates a highly spiritual side to the nature, obtained by persistent effort in past lives, and of inestimable value in the inner conflict to distinguish between illusion and reality. There is an innate attraction toward and understanding of spiritual truths, and a mentality that is quick, intuitive, and progressive. The natural practical ability of the Taurian may be directed into accomplishment along spiritual lines, rather than along purely material lines. Since Neptune is in the 7th house, the trine mentioned also indicates the probability of marriage to one who is of an occult, inspirational nature, as well as success as a public speaker on occult and mystical subjects.

The Taurians, ruled by Venus, are naturally artistic and musical, and this child should have more than average ability in these fields. In addition to the trine of the Sun, Uranus, and Mercury to Neptune, there is the sextile of Jupiter and Saturn in the 2nd to Mars and Venus in Cancer in the 5th. They,Too,Can Go to Heaven

The animals came to church here today, and they sat very solemnly as they heard a Church of England clergyman say there is a very good chance they will go to heaven. They will have to be good of course.

The extraordinary occasion for such piety in the animal kingdom was a special service at the Holy Trinity Church on the eve of the Feast of St. Francis, the patron saint of the animals.

Children of the community were invited to bring their pets. So, well behaved and decorous among the worshiping were:

Dozens of cats and kittens, some pretty with starched ribbons.

A tiddler in a jar—a tiddler being an English version of a sunfish.

A lamb with fleece only slightly soiled, accompanied by 8-year-old Mary Hyde.

Dogs, of course, including a bull mastiff and a tiny Pekinese.

A white mouse, which made some of the little girls nervous, was brought by 6-yearold Philip Parsons.

The 20 horses, brushed sleek for the occasion, were sized up by the head usher, who came to the doleful decision that they were too big for the pews. So they had to wait outside.

The Rev. L. J. Snell then told of the life of St. Francis and the work of the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

"Animals and birds are a part of God's creation," he told the beaming children, "and there is nothing contrary to our Christian religion in the belief that our pets will live hereafter.

"There are animals and birds in Heaven as well as human beings and angels."

There were some growls and squeals, but no unseemly incidents. It turned out that the bull mastiff who made a pass at a basket of kittens wanted to lick them, not eat them.—Los Angeles Examiner, October, 1948.

Each species of animal is under the guidance and direction of what is known to the occultist as a Group Spirit which is an archangel belonging to a different

Call it modernistic art, surrealism, or by any other name, such productions as mentioned in the above reprint are still nothing short of monstrosities of art, producing grotesque, ridiculous effects which divert the mind from beauty and perfection and center it on distorted misshapen form, ugly and disarranged, which breeds disorder and confusion; and if too long indulged in, can easily lead to derangement of the mental faculties. Furthermore, such productions reveal the true character of their creator. Culture and appreciation of beauty, harmony, and balanced proportion are nowhere expressed in these incongruous creations and if looked upon too long are likely to have a disorganizing effect on the nervous system.

Modern art, surrealism, or whatever one wishes to call it, belongs to the same low vibration as does the discordant, inharmonious, so-called music which is filling the air; and both are a throwback to prehistoric times when man was not fully aware of the fact that he had a physical body and was just beginning to develop a brain. READERS' QUESTIONS

The Trinity

Question:

I do not understand the statement made by Jesus, "He that hath seen Me hath seen the Father." (John 14:9.) Will you please explain what is meant? Answer:

The Gospel by Saint John emphasizes more than the other three Gospels the Religion of the Father and the actuality of the Holy Trinity. It is to the Doctrine of the Trinity that he refers in the statement you mention.

God is One, but at the same time He is triune, embodying the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, or the Will, the Wisdom, and the Activity Principles. Each is a definite spiritual Power, but they are closely interrelated and function as a unit. Max Heindel, in *Gleanings* of a Mystic, gives the following clarifying information on this subject:

"The inspired apostle gave us a wonderful definition of Deity when he said that 'God is Light,' and therefore 'light' has been used to illustrate the nature of the Divine in the Rosicrucian Teachings, especially the mystery of the Trinity in Unity. It is clearly taught in the Holy Scriptures of all times that God is one and indivisible. At the same time we find that as the one white light is refracted into three primary colors, red, yellow, and blue, so God appears in a threefold role during manifestation by the exercise of the three divine functions of *creation, preservation*, and *dissolution*.

"When He exercises the attribute of *creation*, God appears as Jehovah, the *Holy Spirit*; He is then Lord of law and

generation and projects the solar fertilizing principle *indirectly* through the lunar satellites of all planets where it is necessary to furnish bodies for their evolving beings.

"When He exercises the attribute of *preservation* for the purpose of sustaining the bodies generated by Jehovah under the laws of Nature, God appears as the Redeemer, *Christ*, and radiates the principles of love and regeneration *directly* into any planet where the creatures of Jehovah require this help to extricate themselves from the meshes of mortality and egotism in order to attain to altruism and endless life.

"When God exercises the divine attribute of *dissolution*, He appears as *The Father* who calls us back to our heavenly home to assimilate the fruits of experience and soul growth garnered by us during the day of manifestation. This Universal Solvent, the ray of the Father, emanates from the Invisible Spiritual Sun.

"These divine processes of creation and birth, preservation and life, and dissolution, death, and return to the Author of our being we see everywhere about us, and we recognize the fact that they are activities of the Triune God in manifestation."

In Freemasonry and Catholicism we find further helpful information: "Let the student ponder well the relation of fire and flame; the formes lies sleeping, invisible in everything, and is kindled into light in various ways: by a blow of a hammer upon a stone, by friction of wood against wood and by chemical action, etc. This gives us a clue to the
identity and state of *The Father*, 'whom no man hath seen at any time,' but who is revealed in 'The Light of the World,' the Son, who is the highest Initiate of the Sun Period. As the unseen fire is revealed in the flame, so also the fullness of the Father dwelt in the Son, and they are one as fire is one with the flame in which it manifests."

Helping Others

Question:

You stress helping others by means of the Philosophy and astrology, but do you not think there is a real danger in attempting to advise others until one has some firsthand knowledge of his own?

Answer:

In our opinion there are many opportunities for aiding others by means of the Philosophy and astrology before one has gained the firsthand knowledge which positive clairvoyance makes possible, and it is our duty to share our knowledge with others, as well as to use our talents, as taught by Christ Jesus in Chapter 25 of St. Matthew's Gospel. However, we certainly do not think that it is sensible to advise others until one is fully competent to do so, particularly by means of astrology.

Insufficiently trained and inexperienced astrologers can do a great deal of harm, and it would be for the eternal welfare of all concerned if every astrologer realized the full extent of his responsibility in giving out information or advising from the horoscope. Especially is this true in diagnosis of disease, for few people can withstand the power of suggestion sufficiently to keep from being affected by adverse information. Certainly, much discrimination should be exercised in using astrology, even by those who are not only technically trained but also spiritually developed.

As for helping others with our knowledge of the Philosophy, or with our knowledge of spiritual truth, we should say, there is surely much help that can be given simply from an understanding of the basic laws of Rebirth, Cause and Effect, Attraction, etc., even if we have not yet unfolded our faculties sufficiently to know that they are true by "firsthand" knowledge. Much that our reason and intuition sanction can of course be proved by experience and observation here on this physical plane.

Let us take, for example, someone who comes to us with the problem of being mistreated or misunderstood by others. Surely there can be no doubt in the mind of any occult student that our thoughts and feelings establish a vibratory rate which attracts to us people and environment of a like nature. In other words, our outer environment is a reflection of our inner state, and if we would change our circumstances we must start with ourselves and establish a new auric vibratory rate. When we think and act in a kindly, considerate manner toward others, we will surely receive kindly, considerate treatment from others. That can and has been demonstrated many, many times by students of Truth all over the world. In fact the power of the Love vibration has no bounds, and the more we practice the use of it and encourage others to do the same the sooner will peace and harmony be established in our own lives and in the lives of others.

As a final word concerning the giving of advice to others, let us emphasize the fact that we should always encourage people to make their own decisions, and thus learn the highly essential quality of self-reliance. We best help others by helping them to help themselves.

Occult Biochemistry

T IS BECOMING more and more a recognized fact that malfunctions of the physical organism are a precipitation into the objective world of an inner, egoic condition of imbalance. The American Medical Association, for example, has said that ninety per cent of all alimentary and intestinal disorders are caused by chronic worry. This is but another instance of proof that all of the multifaceted aspects of phenomenal existence can be traced back to an underlying unity.

There are two substances, chemical and life ether, which are used by forces of nature to create form. Each ether expresses itself in two separate and distinct phases, or poles. One pole is predominantly positive and aggressive, the other is predominantly negative and passive. It is from the union of these two poles of this universal substance that form is created.

Within every living cell of the body there is a positive and negative vibration. The positive vibration finds expression through the medium of potassium phosphate, which is positive and energetic in action; the negative vibration finds expression through the medium of calcium phosphate, which is negative in its expression. The two sexes symbollize and express this same duality, the male being the positive, and the female the negative.

Calcium phosphate is the base of all protoplasmic matter, in which is imbedded and nourished the positively charged nucleus. Milk has been hailed for years as the most perfect and complete food, and when we realize its calcium content is larger than that of any other food the importance of milk to the growing organism can be easily seen. Calcium phosphate has an affinity for albumin, and this affinity is of prime importance in forming the protoplasmic substance of living cells. The albumin content of the pituitary secretions indicates that gland as the controlling center for the creation of new cells.

For many years members of the medical profession have labored in little known laboratories seeking a specific for the common cold. Their labor would be more productive if they turned their attention to the body's assimilation and use of the pituitary secretions, and appiled these findings to the problem of the common cold. These secretions of the pituitary gland have a high albumin content (as science has already discovered); albumin requires calcium phosphate to form protoplasm; and protoplasm is a necessary component in the formation of new cells. In these words is found the crux of the problem of the common

cold, for the cold is only the result of nature's efforts to rid the body of an excess of albumin.

Esoterically, it can be said that a predominantly positive attitude of mind, a highly aggressive personality, will project itself into the body functions. Negative emotions, too, will be so projected. Perfect health is the result of a perfect balance in the body, a harmonium, of its positive and negative poles. The outer self and the inner self are only more or less attenuated degrees of the One existence.

As calcium phosphate combines with albumin in the anabolism of cell structure to embody the positive pole of the universal creative substance, calcium sulphate is needed in the building of cell walls to protect and keep virgin and segregated the protoplasm thus formed. This wall performs the function of excluding all foreign substance detrimental to the well-being and perfect functioning of the cell life, and expelling from the cell all waste products incidental to its growth and development. The cell wall not only excludes from the cell all inimical matter, but it permits the passage through the wall and into the protoplasm of all substances required for its nourishment. A rather crude comparison is polarized glass, which is transparent when approached from one side and impervious to the transmission of light waves from the other side.

Each cell is a unit of consciousness, autonomous consciousness, which confers on it the ability to select and reject the substances which contribute to the good or ill of its existence. This cell consciousness, sometimes called simple consciousness, operates automatically and invariably, and the successful performance of this function is in no manner related to the bulk of food eaten. Large amounts of the favored foods of today are devitalized of the substances necessary for cell nourishment, During the recent war it was discovered that many

young men from wealthy families, who were in a position to eat as much food and as great variety of food as they desired, were actually undernourished. The term *hidden hunger* was coined from this discovery.

The medical profession is in the habit of speaking learnedly of those little animals we call germs, and of how they cause the various diseases. But the truth is that any disease is caused by a lack, and the germ is a secondary *effect*.

When insufficient amounts of calcium sulphate are taken into the body, the cell wall cannot efficiently perform its function, and if this lack becomes serious the cell wall will disintegrate. The disintegration will permit the protoplasmic body of the cell to be flooded with metabolic poisons. This dying, disintegrating protoplasm is what is known as pus. The body must rid itself of this waste in some manner, and that is the function of the germs. The germ is a microscopic amoeba-like animal which consumes pus as it is formed in the body. Thus it is that the much maligned germ serves a good and useful purpose in the economy of life. When the germs have accomplished their purpose, in spite of the large amounts of toxic substances that man solemnly swallows to destroy the germs, man "gets well."

If the formation of pus in the body proceeds at a greater rate than the ability of the germs to consume it, the body (the intelligent consciousness in each cell) will create an abnormal heat to burn away the excess waste matter. And man seeks to destroy this fever just as assiduously as he seeks to destroy the germ!

One of the prime requisites of healthy body tissue is that it be elastic. It must be noted that elasticity means not only the ability to expand, but the ability to contract as well. This factor of elasticity can be demonstrated by pinching up the loose skin on the back of the hand and watching it spring back when released. if the same experiment is performed on a dead body, the tissue will retain the position it is forced into.

Calcium fluoride is the substance in the body which gives tissue this *tone*, and the lack of the proper amount becomes evident in many ways. Double chin, wrinkles, varicose veins, dandruff, brittle nails, horny skin, etc., all are conditions that indicate such a lack. There is also a close connection between this condition in the body and such neurotic emotions as anxiety, fear, melancholia, and mental dullness.

Calcium fluoride is necessary to build tensile strength into body tissue. This is particularly important to the sac which encases the brain. An active brain requires this tone in its sac, which holds the positive and negative poles together and prevents the dullness and loggy feeling that is sometimes experienced. This lack of tone is also prevalent in all cases of *ptosis*.

Most of the above information can be found in any standard treatise on biochemistry, but perfect health cannot be maintained just by knowing these things. There are three simple and easy things which must be done to attain that end. They are: (a) Correct eating, (b) correct breathing, (c) correct thinking.

Let it be clearly understood, there is no nutritive value in vitamin pills. The taking of vitamin pills is an attempt artificially to vitalize modern foods which have been devitalized. There are many cases where vitamin pills have been observed to have a toxic effect.

All fresh food, in its natural, unadulterated state, is a balance or combination of the positive and negative poles of the creative force. A grain of wheat, for example, has a positively charged kernel and a negatively charged husk, and an Intelligence greater than that of any human has contrived this arrangement so that when the whole grain is eaten man is consuming a naturally balanced diet. This principle of balance is found in all fruits and vegetables. But man, in his negative colossal conceit, creates a condition of imbalance by discarding the negatively polarized coating of the grain of wheat; then seeks to restore the original condition by dosing himself with vitamin pills. And man blissfully continues to starve himself, for there is a vast difference between the vitamin content of food, which can be restored, and its natural polarization, which cannot be restored.

Water is a food. In addition to the valuable mineral content, which is a needed adjunct to the nourishing properties of bulkier food, the liquid content of water is necessary to the proper functioning of the body processes. Some three thousand years ago the Egyptians discovered that water has the distinctive and unique occult property of being a cleansing agent of the aura.

The importance of water can be seen in the *chyme*, which is the normally fluidic or semi-fluidic content of the small intestine. This is the sea out of which all life is born, so far as the body is concerned: for it is the fluids, not the solids, that are absorbed from the intestine and distributed throughout the system. Physiologically, perfect digestion is possible only when the *chyme* is kept fluidic.

Water acts as a catalytic, or solvent, in certain important body functions. Cells, for example are dehydrated after they have performed their work, and their poison-laden water is carried to the excretory organs where the waste is deposited, and the purified water is reused.

One of the most dangerous by-products of metabolism is the various acids. Normally, water helps to neutralize these acids. Oxalic acid is largely caused by the popular way of preparing grain foods, referred to above. That is what your doctor is talking about when he warns against a starchy diet. Uric acid, and sulphuric and phosphoric acids are

largely caused by an excessively protein diet. There are others, and it is normal for these acids to be present in the body, except in excess.

The person who knows how to breathe correctly, and does so, is a rare creature. It has been estimated that in an entire life span the average person never uses more than two-thirds of his available lung area. The unused portion of the lung will eventually begin to atrophy and disintegrate, and soon reach the point where there is incipient tuberculosis, pneumonia, etc.

The air that is breathed supplies the body cells with that intangible positive pole of life, just as the food we eat contributes toward the building of the negative pole. In addition to this positive charge, the four air elements, oxygen, hydrogen, nitrogen, and carbon contribute to the building of the organic part of each cell.

Each cell of the body breathes. (Refer to the remarks above about calcium fluoride.) The deeper the cell breathes, the more alive it is, for as the cell breathes it oxidizes the waste products of cell growth. This residue is excreted through the lungs, as carbon dioxide, and of course the deeper the individual breathes the more carbon dioxide can be exhaled. This deep breathing should be practiced until it becomes involuntary.

The intelligence that is inherent in each cell will direct the body process perfectly if it is not interfered with by the individual. However, this intelligence is entirely subjective in its reasoning, and can very easily be imposed upon and controlled by the objective will. A sustained feeling of cruelty, for example, will produce defective vision; a sustained mental attitude of jealousy will produce liver and gall bladder disorders, and the cause and effect will on occasion manifest in two different incarnations.

Intestinal and digestive process are more sensitive to thoughts and emotions than perhaps any other body functions. The chyme, as we have pointed out, should normally be in a fluidic or semifluidic state; but hard, grasping thoughts will harden and crystallize the chyme, causing constipation and other disorders.

Correct thinking means constructive, creative thinking. We must develop the habit of directing our attention away from mean, petty things, for what our attention is upon, we become. We can avoid childish and destructive displays of temper by remembering that we are not offended until we take offense. Our physical health is a projection of our mental health. We must be obedient to the Laws of Life in all respects, else a discordant condition will surely result. Some two thousand years ago a Great Teacher told us about all this, but judging from the many ills that afflict mankind, we have been very inept pupils.
